On the weekend of January 18th and 19th, Alcester held its first Window Wanderland event, with many residents and businesses entering. Alcester Town Council are in negotiations with Stratford District Council in relation to obtaining a long-term lease on the Greig Hall with a view to bringing it back in to use for the residents of Alcester and the surrounding area.

I am very pleased to tell you that Alcester Town Council was shortlisted for an award in the "Thrive Mental Health Star Awards" awarded by West Midlands Combined

Authority. We were nominated for our work with the mental health charity Lifespace and students of our local Secondary schools. Myself, Vanessa the Town Clerk and Wendy, our Health and Well Being Coordinator attended the ceremony which was held at West Bromwich Albion Football Club. We did not win but it was a fantastic achievement to have been nominated.

This year, 2020, we celebrate the 75th anniversary of Victory in Europe Day. The May Day Bank Holiday, traditionally held on the first Monday, has been moved to Friday 8th May to mark the day when fighting against Germany came to an end in Europe. Alcester Town Council in conjunction with the Alcester Branch of the Royal British Legion and many other local organisations are working hard to organise events in Alcester to celebrate this historic occasion.

I would like to end my last Mayor's Message by thanking my husband Tim and my family for their support in the past year and also thanks go to my fellow Councillors and all the Council staff for their hard work that has been put in this year especially to Vanessa, the Town Clerk, and Sarah, the Deputy Town Clerk, whose support has been invaluable this year. Court Leet

The following statement was made by the Mayor at the Town Council meeting on 4th February 2020:

"The Town Council has no role or authority over outside bodies in the town and therefore will not be making any comments in relation to the Court Leet.

All Councillors are entitled to their personal opinion in relation to the Court Leet, or indeed any other organisation in the town, but any statements made by Councillors are in their capacity as residents of the town and are not endorsed by the Town Council."

Precept 2020-21

The Town Council sets the precept each year in January. The precept is the primary source of income for the Town Council and is a small part of the Council Tax which residents pay to Stratford-on-Avon District Council.

At the Full Council meeting on 7th January 2020, the Town Council agreed to request a precept of £279,620 from Stratford on Avon District Council for the year 2020-21. The precept in 2019-20 was £259,832.

The Council has taken steps during the year to review significant expenditure and to make savings where possible but regrettably prices always increase year on year. A major part of the precept goes on staffing costs and increases in the minimum wage just announced for April 2020 and anticipated rises in local government salary scales are outside the Council's control. This year, Stratford-on-Avon District Council has withdrawn the Council Tax support grant to Alcester of £16,890 which has largely resulted in the increased precept this year.

The agreed precept will result in a small increase in the precept charge to Alcester residents (Band D) from £118.64 to £129.17 per annum. This rise is equivalent to 20 pence per week for a Band D Council Taxpayer.

The Town Council uses the precept to run council business and to provide a range of services to residents. These include four allotment sites, four play grounds, the cemetery on Birmingham Road, civic and community events, grants to voluntary organisations, the Health and Wellbeing project, maintenance and upkeep of the Eric Payne Community Centre, maintenance of Priory Meadow, Centenary Field and other open spaces and miscellaneous street furniture such as signs, benches and bins.

UPDATE ALCESTER NEIGHBOURHOOD DEVELOPMENT PLAN

The Plan contains policies on Housing and the Built Environment; Economy; Transport and Infrastructure; Community, Leisure and Well-being and the Natural Environment. When the Plan is adopted, anyone submitting planning applications must comply with the policies in order that future development respects the needs and character of the town. Alcester will also benefit from additional money that developers will have to provide for local infrastructure and facilities.

We are pleased to report that at last the Plan is nearing its completion. Following a comprehensive review by the Independent Examiner, he produced a favourable report In January. The Examiner suggested some minor modifications which the Alcester Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group has considered and accepted. The Plan already has considerable weight in the planning determination process but will not have full weight until formally adopted by Stratford on Avon District Council (SDC).

The Examiner recommended that the Plan progress to the next stage which is a local referendum. This should take place soon. If the majority of voters vote in its favour it will be adopted by SDC and its policies will inform planning decisions.

The Steering Group are keen that as many residents as possible vote on the Plan. Please look out for a summary leaflet which will be delivered to your home, together with a polling card from SDC giving details of the voting day and locations to cast your vote.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR REPORT

I am delighted to report that the repairs to the pavements in Roman Way are now nearing completion. This has taken a long time to happen. However, I hope that the pavements will be in excellent condition for a long time to come.

The roads safety works around Alcester Academy and Captains Hill have been completed. This comprised passive and active speed signage, drop kerbs, 'H' bars over the access to residents' drives and reminders to motorists that they are entering a school area. An extended standing area has been installed around the bus stop on Captains Hill. It was considered to be potentially dangerous due to the narrowness of the pavement.

We are still seeing some speeding around the town although it is improving so thank you all. You may have noticed 20mph roundels painted on the roads in the 20mph zone. This came about as drivers complained that they did not always see the small 20mph zone signs. Another concern raised is, once again, inconsiderate parking. We all see cars or vans parked half on the pavement, half on the road. People with prams and buggies are still being forced into the road which is of course not safe. Please consider other road users when parking.

School Road. This is a busy road especially at school drop off and pick up times. In spite of WCC writing to the coach companies, we are still seeing large (some very large) coaches using the road against their guidance. We have held meetings with all interested parties and believe we have a strategy that can help protect pedestrians, especially from coaches mounting the kerbs.

It is accepted that idling car engines can significantly reduce air quality and create health problems. Many modern cars have an automatic engine stop feature if the car is stationary for a short time. If your car is not fitted with such a system please consider turning your engine off if stationary for more than a few seconds, especially in public places. Stationary idling is actually an offence under section 42 of the Road Traffic Act 1988 and liable to a £20 spot fine.

PLANNING MATTERS

Since the last newsletter, the Planning Committee has met 4 times and considered 20 applications. The majority of the applications were approved, reported below are significant issues.

11th November 2019: Six members of the public attended to express their concerns with respect to 19/02770/FUL- Garage Blocks Alauna Avenue Alcester. Proposed: Demolition of 30 lock-up garages and construction of five dwellings and associated works. The Planning Committee had the following concerns- overdevelopment, inadequate parking provision including no allocation for visitors, inappropriate terracing effect that does not reflect the vernacular of the area. It was therefore agreed to submit a HOLDING OBJECTION. The application was reviewed on 6 January 2020 with amendments and the previous decision of OBJECTION was sustained with additional comments as follows: An accurate, detailed and to scale site plan is required, the visual changes are a retrograde step, concerns have been raised by residents in terms of overlooking, inadequate bin storage provision and potential issues of obstruction on bin collection days. Whilst acknowledging that this is not a planning matter, the committee are aware of land ownership issues in terms of the proposal.

Conversion of The Swan, Swan Street

Highbury Design Chartered Architects and, MSC Planning gave an informal presentation on 2 December 2019 on behalf of the property owner for a proposal for the conversion of The Swan, Swan Street. Outline proposal for a mixed-use development was expressed to enhance and invest in the iconic Grade II listed building. The proposal comprises 4x commercial units on the ground floor class A1/A2 or B1 and 7x residential 2/3 bed units on the upper floors. Cllrs had questions about demand for commercial units as there are currently empty shops in the High Street, logistics for the parking provision for mixed use and disabled access to the residential units.

27 January 2020:

SDC Supplementary Planning Document (SPD) Part V: Climate Change Mitigation and Adaptation is out for consultation until 21 February 2020.

The Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) is also being changed to an Infrastructure Funding Statement.

Croft Lane Power Station application will be coming forward again in March with various changes, but the documentation remains of poor quality. It will go to SDC Planning Committee.

19/03580/FUL- Oversley Mill Services Alcester Bypass Arrow B49 6PQ. Proposed: Proposed redevelopment of existing Petrol Filling Station, comprising of a replacement shop/canopy, new pumps/pipework, car/jet wash area, extended car park and new Coffee Drive Thru store. Cllrs had serious concerns regarding the following: Road safety issues- traffic flow of cars and HGVs through an already busy site and lack of provision of disabled bays at Electric charging points. In line with the emerging Referendum version of the Alcester Neighbourhood Development Plan Policy EC 5 (which now carries considerable weight in the planning process), cllrs would like to request an impact assessment of this business from SDC. Cllrs are both surprised and disappointed that there are no solar panels associated with this application considering SDC are currently consulting on the SPD Part V: Climate Change Mitigation and Adaptation. **OBJECTION.**

He and other members of the AYP were responsible for gathering funds for the youth building 'The Depot', which forms part of the Eric Payne Community Centre on the Jubilee Fields. He also drove fundraising to train volunteers to run the youth clubs and to support young people themselves. Many people in the town benefited from the work that Bill did over many years. His legacy continues; AYP remains an advocate for and a fundraiser for activities for young people in the town.

HEALTH & WELLBEING BOARD ROUNDUP

Alcester has its own Health & Wellbeing Board that meets four times a year to discuss the health & wellbeing issues affecting residents. Priorities are identified from the Joint Strategic Needs Assessment report covering our area and details the health issues affecting our residents.

From those meetings we agree a strategy to target the groups that need the most support. We have now run successful initiatives for Older Persons, Younger Persons Mental Health and Carers.


These projects will continue. However, we are now moving into the realm of social prescribing. What is social prescribing? Social prescribing is a way for local agencies to refer people to a link worker. Link workers give people time, focusing on 'what matters to me' and taking a holistic approach to people's health and wellbeing. They connect people to community groups and statutory services for practical and emotional support. Link workers also support existing community groups to be accessible and sustainable and work collaboratively with local partners.

In essence, it is about engaging with those in need to improve their happiness and wellbeing. The surgery in Alcester now has a part time social prescriber or link worker and as a town we have many organisations that you can be signposted to.

- Choose Upgrade this PC now, assuming this is the only PC you're upgrading. (If you're upgrading a different machine, choose Create installation media for another PC, and save the installation files.) Follow the prompts.
- When the upgrade is complete, go to Settings Update & Security > Activation, and you should see a digital license for Windows 10.
