UPDATE ALCESTER NEIGHBOURHOOD DEVELOPMENT PLAN

The <u>Plan</u> contains draft policies on Housing and the Built Environment; Economy; Transport and Infrastructure; Community, Leisure and Well-being and the Natural Environment. When the Plan is finalised, anyone submitting planning applications must follow the policies in order that future development respects the needs and character of the town. Alcester will also benefit from additional money that developers will have to provide for local infrastructure and facilities.

We had hoped that the Plan would be finalised in May but unfortunately the COVID-19 pandemic meant that the local referendum had to be postponed. Currently it's not clear when the referendum will be rescheduled and at worst case it may not be until next May. We will let residents know once we have a date and deliver a summary leaflet to your home.

The good news is that even in its current status the Plan caries significant weight when planning applications are being considered. Amongst the policies are those which protect our local green spaces which many of us have been grateful for when taking daily exercise in recent weeks.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR REPORT

The Covid19 crisis has affected every level of society, none more so than local authorities. Within a few short days of the lockdown announcement by the Prime Minister, actions were being taken to provide support for our residents.

Shielding hubs were set up under the control of Warwickshire County Council (WCC) working closely with Stratford on Avon District Council (SDC). It was a huge logistical challenge, but thanks to the close collaboration between the authorities and with support from the army, it went very smoothly. Staff from both authorities worked to distribute many hundreds of food parcels to the very vulnerable unable to get out of their homes.

WCC are the Health Authority and are responsible for Health and Social Care. In the period of the crisis so far, no hospitals within our trusts have run out of intensive care beds or PPE. No care homes were 'red flagged' meaning that they had run out of PPE. This is a testament to the organisation of the county in these times. Well done to all.

One of the biggest concerns to Councillors at this time is of course for our business community. The order to shut a business down unless able to continue trading safely has had a devastating effect on many small and medium sized businesses. Government grant aid has been passed to many such businesses via the local authorities. So far SDC has paid out more than £28m to over 1500 businesses.

If you know of a business that has been unable to obtain a grant or arrange a loan, please call or email me. Details below.

Due to social distancing restrictions, the waste & recycling centres were closed, however roadside collections have remained fully operational. Most sites opened on 18 May for essential visits but only to residents that have booked online at the WCC website (link below). There will be some restrictions on what can be taken to the sites. People arriving without an appointment will unfortunately be turned awayso please book in advance.

Work on our highways has stopped until social distancing rules could be drawn up. We hope to restart some road maintenance shortly. However, larger works may have to come later.

Even with Government help, all local authorities will see a fall in revenue and income this year. SDC will see a significant fall in revenue and be one of the hardest affected in the country. We do not expect to see a return to 2019 levels of tourism for some years to come.

Finally, we often hear the phrase 'front line heroes'. Well, many of our staff have performed that role beyond the call of duty. A magnificent achievement and my thanks to them all.

ALCESTER COMMUNITY RESILIENCE

The Alcester Community Resilience group was set up in response to the COVID-19 outbreak and the lockdown measures introduced by the UK Government in mid-March.

The group offers practical and emotional support to residents in the parishes of Alcester, Kinwarton, Arrow & Weethley and Great Alne. It comprises over 200 registered volunteers who provide help such as shopping, dog walking, prescription collection and companionship calls.

By mid-May the group had received nearly 500 requests for assistance and will remain in place for as long as people need it.

The group has received financial support from Alcester Town Council which has been used to provide twice weekly complimentary meals to the most vulnerable residents in our area.

ALCESTER'S KIDS RUN FREE- Launches Activity Hub to keep children moving



Alcester-based children's charity Kids Run Free (KRF) has set up an extensive Activity Hub packed with exercises and games to keep young people of Warwickshire and across the rest of the country active during the current period of lockdown.

Younger kids can <u>'Get Active with Dash'</u>, the charity's friendly mascot, as he takes on various exercise challenges which can be found on the KRF YouTube channel, as well as lots of games such as 'Freeze Dance', 'Land, Sea and Air' and 'Sharks and Minnows,' many of which were filmed in the local Alcester community.

And for older children, there are workouts specifically for teenagers on the <u>Marathon Teens</u> YouTube channel, while Nike Community Ambassadors have been busy putting together a series of high-intensity videos which will go live on the KRF facebook page and YouTube over the coming weeks.

'Clearly, it's a challenging time for our children, and while they have been kept busy with work being sent from schools, we also thought it would be a good idea to produce content that hopefully inspires them to keep active during this period. Lots of local people have been in touch with suggestions, ideas and even contributed their own live video workouts that we have been streaming on the KRF

each week' said Martine Verweij, founder and CEO of Kids Run Free.







NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH ALCESTER



It is wonderful to report that many types of crime in the UK have fallen sharply since the start of the Covid-19 lockdown and that many examples of good neighbourliness have risen.

Government Measures to stay at home have led to a surge in good neighbourliness as people look out for the vulnerable and talk to those next door more than ever before, according to a new study. Almost three quarters (72%) of UK adults can now identify which

of their neighbours are vulnerable.

A fifth (21%) say they have spoken to their neighbours more in the past two weeks and, one in ten (10%) say they have got to know them more. Despite not being able to spend time physically with neighbours, a sixth (16%) of UK adults say their relationship has become better in the last two weeks.

Almost a fifth (18%) say they have chatted online or over the phone to their neighbours in the last two weeks and a further sixth (16%) have dropped off essential food and medicine for them.

The different ways people are keeping in touch with neighbours

- Almost half (46%) have spoken to their neighbours in the street at a distance
- Two fifths (42%) have chatted to them over a garden fence or wall
- Over a quarter (28%) have waved at their neighbours through a window
- A quarter (26%) have checked to see if they need anything
- 18% have spoken to them on the phone or online
- 17% have spoken to them about the Government's advice to stay at home
- 12% have dropped off shopping for them
- 4% have dropped off essential medication

Furthermore, the study shows technology is playing a huge part in keeping communities in contact. In the last two weeks alone, a sixth (17%) of people have received new contact details for their neighbours, ensuring they can keep in touch during this time.

Neighbourhood Watch believes that building strong communities where neighbours look out for each other is key and it's good to be reminded of the ordinary people who make our nation great even in the most trying of times. The kind, everyday deeds of neighbours help create safe, secure and happy neighbourhoods where people, families and communities thrive and it's times like these that communities need to stick together and look out for one another.
