MAYOR'S MESSAGE

As I write this winter message, an action-packed October has ended, and an even busier November has begun.

Below is a snapshot of the ten local and six civic events Sue and I attended during October.

The month always gets off to a great start with the arrival of the MOP bringing that much loved fairground atmosphere to the town. After the opening ceremony, we were delighted to join the hordes of children eagerly trailing behind the High Bailiff as he led them through the fair, inviting them to climb aboard the free rides that follow the traditional opening ceremony. The mixed weather failed to dampen the joyful screams, laughter, and excitement of all those youngsters.

We left the Mop to travel across to Warwick to gather with other mayors, civic leaders, and members of the judiciary in celebrating the newly elected High Sheriff of Warwickshire's service of thanksgiving and to mark the start of the new legal year.

Two days later we attended our own Court Leet elections, witnessing the appointment of Tracey Parkes as High Bailiff and Sharon Constable as Low Bailiff - the first female duo elected to these roles in the Court Leet's 700-year history.

The annual 10k race on the 6th October saw more than 700 runners taking part. There are some very fit people in Alcester!

Being in the company of The Crafty Lunch Club members was a really special day for us; the pumpkin competition challenged our best creative skills (see the photo for our attempts!), followed by an exhausting amount of singing and dancing!

Joining 300 others at the Greig Hall, we enjoyed a hearty breakfast at the second of two Big Breakfast events organised by Alcester & Bidford Rotary. This was followed by a really entertaining evening with the Alcester Musical Theatre Company, when we attended their performance of The Addams Family at the Palace Theatre in Redditch.

In the second half of the month, we were pleased to represent Alcester at Civic Events held at Whitnash, Leamington Spa and Kineton; support fundraising occasions in Coleshill; and back in

CLERK'S CORNER

Alcester Town Council is a member of the Stratford District CCTV Partnership which manages the CCTV cameras in public areas of the town. The Town Council contributes £6000 a year towards the CCTV coverage of Alcester. The monitoring of all cameras, 24 hours a day, seven days a week, is carried out from one location- the Stratford-on-Avon District Council CCTV Control Room.

All of the cameras and the control room have recently been upgraded, guaranteeing high quality pictures that are admissible in court as evidence. All staff work a rotating shift pattern ensuring optimum cover at peak times. CCTV staff have a direct radio link with the Warwickshire Police force control room and officers on the ground.

Footage of incidents is routinely made available to the police for use in the investigation of reported crimes, missing persons or suspect activity and is used to assist in the prosecution of offenders in the courts. Here are some examples of incidents where CCTV played an important role in Alcester:

Public Disorder

CCTV provided evidence and images to the police during a public order incident during the Mop. During the incident, the direction of the CCTV Operators allowed Police to be guided to the offenders and allowed them to make an arrest, which helped restore order and allow families to continue their enjoyment of the Mop.

Careless Driving

CCTV followed up an enquiry after a car drove through a road closure in place for the Remembrance service parade. CCTV were able to find the offending vehicle and pass the details on to the police to make further enquiries.

Driving whilst impaired

CCTV monitored a driver crash into the railings of a park. CCTV contacted the police and as they monitored the situation, they saw the driver get out. He clearly looked intoxicated. The individual then left the vehicle and entered an address that CCTV monitored. They updated the police, who were soon on the scene, and arrested the driver for being unfit to drive through drink or drugs. The CCTV was later provided to police to help with the investigation.

Alcester Community Shed Opens!

The successful transformation of the old squash courts into the Community Shed is complete and it was officially opened on 25th October by the Mayor, Cllr Mike Bowe.



The project took almost a year and involved many contractors and volunteers who worked together to produce this wonderful community asset. The cost of the work was met by securing grants and generous donations at no expense to ratepayers. It is a welcoming space with a fully equipped workshop where people can join together to make and mend, learning new skills, having fun and making new friends. And, of course, after the work is done there is space to relax over a tea or coffee.

The building is managed by Alcester Town Council and is home to the Alcester Community Shed group. During a busy couple of open days in September many residents showed interest in Shed membership and many have now joined. As well as sessions where members can use the hand

tools, we plan to get trainers in to teach how to safely use the machine plus demonstrations by

tools such as the lathe, experienced professionals.

PLANNING UPDATE

Roofspace Solutions brought forward a planning application to formalise their current working arrangements on the Birmingham Road site. They have addressed some of the issues, especially those for large vehicles, by creating up to 5 parking spaces on-site. Concerns still remain regarding noise and neighbouring amenity. We have therefore objected, until we see the environmental officer's report.

A recent application to convert a garage into additional accommodation for a dwelling would have resulted in insufficient parking spaces and non-compliance with both SDC's policy document and our NDP. WCC highways agreed with our objection that it would be yet another lost parking space and could set a precedent for other in-town properties.

Lloyds Bank submitted an application to remove their cash machine as part of the closure of the bank, which has just been approved. The closure is very disappointing as ATC had worked closely with Lloyds over the years to retain the bank. There are moves afoot to install a banking hub in the Town.

Finally, I have included an application by Pridot Printers in Kings Coughton wishing to increase the available area within their workshop. The officer raised concerns regarding green belt issues and less than substantial harm to the adjacent listed building, the Moat House pub. This application, currently withdrawn, revolves around whether the building is still within the curtilage of the listed building.

REMEMBRANCE 2024

Another great turn out by Alcester for Remembrance Sunday, 10 November 2024, to remember all those who lost their lives in conflict.

The Parade started at Bleachfield Street car park then marched up the High Street to Church Green. The parade was very well supported - led by Alcester Royal British Legion accompanied by Alcester Victoria Silver Band, followed by serving members of

HM forces and veterans, Lord Hertford, Deputy Lord Lieutenant, Alcester Army Cadet Force, Alcester Town Council, other Council representatives, Emergency Services, Alcester Court Leet, Alcester Churches Together, town organisations, youth organisations, schools and junior sports clubs. A short outdoor service was led by Revd Daniel Corlett and Revd Julie Lindsay on Church Green where wreaths were laid, standards presented and lives remembered. The Remembrance Sunday parade was organised by Alcester Town Council in partnership with Alcester Royal British Legion and St Nicholas Church. A short outdoor service on Church Green was also held on Armistice Day, Monday 11 November 2024.

Check your flood risk

In July 2007, many properties in Alcester were flooded and despite over a million pounds being spent on improving flood defences, there are still areas of Alcester that are at high risk of flooding.

Alcester Town Council's Flood Working Group is changing its flood risk procedures. More information on this will be available in the spring newsletter but current plans include:

- Specialist training for Flood Wardens (now referred to as Flood Guardians)
- Production of a Flood Guardian Handbook and Emergency Action Plan Sheet
- A lead group of decision-makers including Councillor Leads and ATC Staff will act on agreed criteria (provided in the Handbook and Emergency Action Sheet) with specific tasks devolved to individual volunteers.

If you would like to volunteer to be a 'Flood Guardian' for Alcester please email administration@alcester-tc.gov.uk.

Of course, we all have a responsibility to protect our own properties. Listed below are the roads which are at greatest risk of flooding as shown in Environment Agency (EA) flood maps. If your property's location is on this list we recommend that you sign up for the EA flood warnings via https://www.gov.uk/sign-up-for-flood-warnings, and prepare your own flood plans to put into action when you get a warning.

You can check your long-term flood risk from both rivers and surface water by using the Check Long Term Flood Risk Service and entering your postcode. You can also find out if river levels are rising upstream on the River Arrow via https://check-for-flooding.service.gov.uk/

The Priority Services Register

Alcester Town Council recommends that vulnerable residents sign up to the Priority Services Register (PSR).

The PSR is free to join. It helps utility companies, including energy suppliers, electricity, gas and water networks to look after customers who have extra communication, access or safety needs. It helps utility companies to tailor their services to support households who need extra help with everyday energy matters like bills, and also in the unlikely event of a power cut or gas or water supply interruption.

You only need to register once and your PSR request is updated with your energy supplier (the company you pay your bills to) and your regional network companies including electricity, gas and water.

Public access water rescue systems

Four new public access water rescue systems/ emergency throwlines have recently been installed along the River Arrow in Alcester. These have been provided in partnership between Alcester Town Council,

Warwickshire Fire and Rescue Service, Warwickshire Police, Church Street Property Trust, Stratford and Alcester Round Table and the Alcester and Bidford Rotary Club. The four emergency throwlines have been installed along the river at the following locations:

- Two at Jubilee Fields
- Abbey Fields
- Nature Reserve

Instructions for use are provided on the boards, along with location details for the emergency services.




Alcester Repair Café is trialling an evening and weekend session in the brand-new Community Shed. If popular, they can be repeated. Taking place on -


